

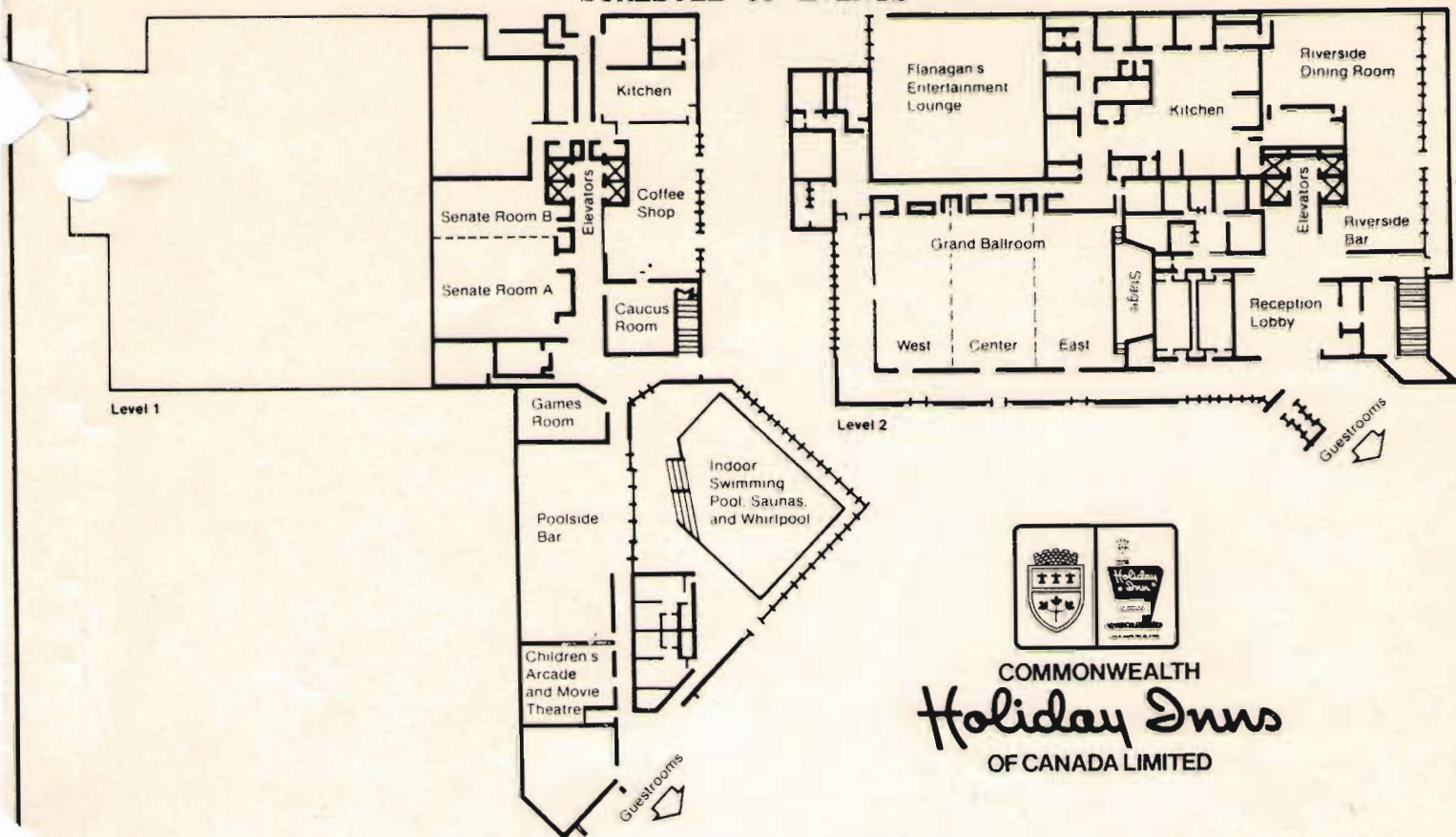

Nurses Note 10th Anniversary

Emergency Department Nurses Association (EDNA) will mark its 10th anniversary during a state conference today and Friday in Holiday Inn on Grand Island.

A reception tomorrow at 6:30 p.m. will precede an anniversary dinner at which charter members will be honored.

The late Anita M. Dorr, who founded the organization, will be honored posthumously.

"Mrs. Dorr's dedication to emergency department nurses and their training gained her national recognition," said Wanda Smith Hackney, a charter member of the organization which grew from a handful of nurses in Buffalo to more than 11,000 members nationwide in less than a decade.

Mrs. Dorr, a supervisor in the admission and emergency department in the former Meyer Memorial Hospital, felt there was a need to upgrade and intensify the quality of nursing care given to patients in emergency situations.

WITH THIS in mind, she started the association as a local group with 14 area hospitals represented. EDNA progressed to a national level, with Mrs. Dorr as national chairman. Members include registered and licensed practical nurses working in hospital emergency departments, as well as industrial and school nurses.

EDNA's purpose is threefold — to promote the exchange of ideas; to conduct seminars, conferences and research on educational methods, emergency treatment and care, and to improve knowledge of emergency techniques through clinical study, laboratory research, publication and teaching.

"We emphasize nurse education and communication. We strive to keep our current skills

updated and to incorporate new skills, trends, procedures and ideas," noted Jane Tischer, president of Western New York EDNA.

Noting that Gov. Carey has declared this week "Emergency Nurse Week," Miss Tischer continued: "In order to be a nurse in any area you have to possess the skills necessary for emergency nursing care and must be ready to handle any situation that might arise.

"This includes dealing with cardiac arrest, industrial accidents such as limbs caught in machinery or a fall down a grain elevator chute, stabbings, shootings, automobile accidents and patients who are unconscious due to diabetes or drug overdoses."

Miss Tischer, a registered nurse on the surgical floor of Buffalo General Hospital who in July will become head nurse in obstetrics in Deaconess Hospital, said public education is among EDNA's goals.

"WE'VE HAD booths for three years at the Erie County Fair, where we teach the public about plant poisonings, cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, how to get an ambulance and how to take care of at-home emergencies," she continued.

Mrs. Hackney, a past president of Western New York EDNA, added: "Belonging to EDNA is belonging to the emergency medical system, which is comprised of physicians, emergency medical technicians and paramedics. We work together, combining our skills and expertise to bring forth quality patient care."

Although it can be stressful,

emergency department work provides a challenging and continual learning experience, said Mrs. Hackney, who has been in the emergency department at Erie County Medical Center and the former Meyer Memorial Hospital for more than 15 years.

Miss Tischer and JoAnn Faldale, president-elect of the local EDNA organization, will be hostesses at the conference, sponsored by the association's New York State Council.

TOPICS TO BE covered by 13 speakers include emergency care of thermal burn victims, standards of hospital care, clinical assessment and priority setting, and assaults.

Carol Forrester, senior staff nurse in emergency care unit of Milton S. Hershey Medical Center, Hershey, Pa., will conduct a workshop on "Radiation" and relate hospital experiences at Three Mile Island.

Local speakers are Dr. Norman Ledwin, director of emergency nurses in Deaconess Division of Buffalo General Hospital, whose topic will be chest injuries, and Dr. James Hassett, director of emergency services at Buffalo General, who will talk about abdominal injuries.
