The New York State Emergency Nurses Association Conference, "Everything Under the Sun," will be a unique and enlightening experience. Another topic that has become a focus for the Joint Commission Accreditation survey is pain management. The emergency nurse must be aware of alternative therapies the patient may be utilizing and the impact it has on the patient's care as well as advocating for the patient in the choices they may make to seek alternative/complementary modalities. Arlene Reinking-Hanf will provide you with practical information and techniques you can use on your patients and Dr. Londorf will demystify aspects of eastern medicine.

Lastly Carolyn West will present a lecture on the care of the patient requiring hyperbarics and the role of hyperbarics as a marketable emergency department service. The uses for hyperbarics have multiplied while the availability is limited. This could be a survival strategy for your ED. Come and learn more.

Your days and evenings will be filled. Plan to come a day early and attend the NYS Council meeting. Set aside Thursday evening for an open reception and early registration. Meet old friends and make new ones. Relax and have fun.

BENJAMIN E. MARETT, RN, MSN, CEN, COHN-S, CNA
